

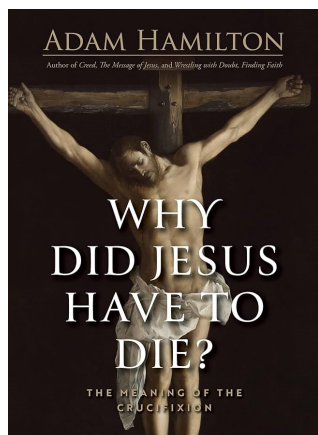

“WHY DID JESUS HAVE TO DIE?”

Lent Worship Series

Two thousand years after Jesus’ crucifixion, the cross remains one of the most recognized symbols in the world. It crowns church steeples, hangs around necks, and fills our hymns and prayers. Christians speak of Jesus “dying for our sins,” but what does that really mean? Through this series based on United Methodist Pastor Adam Hamilton’s new book “Why Did Jesus Have to Die?”, we will slow down with this question and explore the richness of the New Testament’s witness with a variety of theories of the atonement. Each is a piece to the puzzle, which together form a picture of God’s message to us in Jesus Christ.

Wednesday evenings through Lent

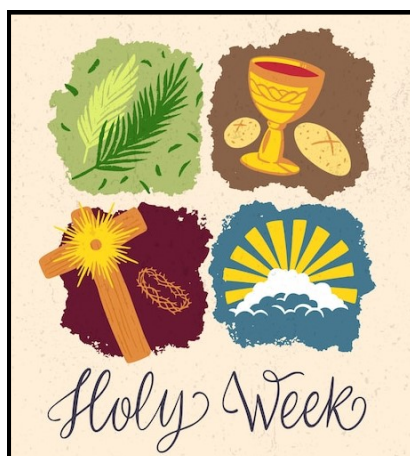
6:00-6:30pm Soup Supper and 6:30 Video with discussion

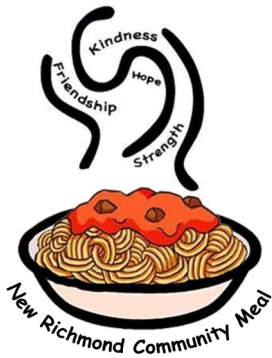

“Souper Bowl of Caring” is a nation-wide event that was started in 1990 with a simple prayer by the Rev. Brad Smith at the Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, South Carolina: “Lord, even as we may enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us to be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat.” The church used the event as a way to bring awareness to the ongoing hunger issues across the country and encourage communities to raise funds and food contributions for their local food charities.

2026 marked our church’s 29th year participating in this event. From the end of January through February 22, we collected pantry items, non-perishable food items and other household items for Five Loaves Food Shelf, and on Sunday, February 15th, we also had a Noisy Can Loose Change Offering after worship. A Piece of History of the New Richmond UMC Piece Corps

This is a first in a series of articles about the beginnings and contributions of the Piece Corp which is a branch of the Missions and Social Concerns of the United Methodist Church.

In September 1974 Mae Vehrs read an article from the Church World Service newsletter asking for Layette for Missions. After encouragement from Rev. Zager, the project started. The church was decorated with pink and blue streamers and booties. Ruth Hop brought an antique baby buggy and playpen in which gifts were placed. It was a huge success except NO diapers.(No Pampers yet!) Flannel was purchased and 25 ladies came and some brought sewing machines and food for lunch. Sunsuits, kimonos, receiving blankets and waterproof quilts were created. The “Sewing Ladies” as they were known, met twice annually . In January 1975, draperies from the old church were ripped apart, washed and used as backing for the first quilts. In 1976 , bandages for a hospital in Nigeria were made. The Seaman’s Mission in Duluth received their first knit Ditty Bags, and has been an ongoing project. In 1977 , varieties of projects suggested a new name.The “Sewing Ladies” became the Piece Corp. The UM Men provided a cupboard for the materials need for quilts, bandages, sweaters, caps and scarves for the Seaman’s Mission . Two new sewing machines were purchased from Memorial Funds. In 1978, pillows and quilts were made and were announced “FOR SALE.” In May of 1979, Holy Family Hospital needed hospital gowns. It was the first association with the hospital. Today, Westfields Hospital still receives support from the Piece Corp. That same year, Church World Service was sent 30 Sewn School Bags, filled with pencils, sharpeners and crayons .

Next month takes us through the 80’s.

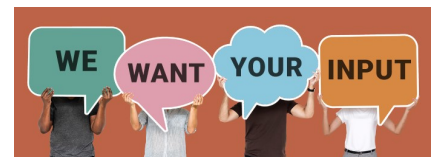

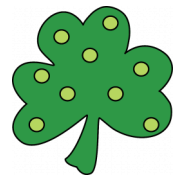


IRA AND STOCK GIFTS

With the help of over 750 stores/brands, it turns our everyday shopping into earnings for our church. Not only can you use Scrip cards for your personal every day purchases, but they also make great gifts! Many of the cards are re-loadable too, like Kwik Trip! Don't have a computer or want to shop online? Contact Kristi in the church office (715-246-2464) or our Organist, Mary Jensen (715-222-0586) and they can place your order for you! It's super easy and not additional cost to you.

Every store/brand gives a rebate percentage- normally between 2% and 16%, and they often run specials for even more! The rebate amount comes directly to our church when a card is purchased at its face value. For instance, if you order a \$100 card and the rebate on it is 4%, the church receives \$4 and you still receive the card for it's face value of \$100. It's a Win-Win! It's easy, it's rewarding, and it fits perfectly into your busy lifestyle.

Instant Access to eGift Cards

In addition to physical gift cards, ShopWithScrip offers ScripNow® eGift cards for over 400 brands. eGift cards are perfect for last-minute or unplanned purchases, like dining out or a quick trip to the mall. You have access to the scrip you need whenever you need it. Place your eGift card order on ShopWithScrip.com or on MyScripWallet.com on your mobile device. When you pay for your eGift cards with online payments (credit card or a linked bank account), you'll receive the eGift cards immediately. All of your eGift cards are housed in your wallet on ShopWithScrip and on your phone in MyScripWallet. You can print eGift cards and present them like a physical gift card in the store or redeem them from MyScripWallet. Redeem them online by entering the card number and PIN when you're checking out. You can also send a ScripNow eGift. It's easy to customize the eGift with a personal note, and send it to anyone, anywhere, with an email address. Our eGift card selection is growing all the time.
